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Ramblings from the Rectory

“Lock ‘em up and throw away the key!”

I wish I had money for every time I heard someone say that. I recently led two high school assemblies on the theme, “Compassion for Prisoners.” I have visited prison so I described the high walls and locked doors. I got them to imagine the sense of the world closing in on you. I had an acute sense of the claustrophobia, something I don’t normally suffer from. All this and I was only a visitor! So the thought of being in a small locked room all day, with others too, is truly terrifying.

Then I asked them to imagine being locked in one of those cells, with no one caring about you, and asked, “Would you like someone to have compassion on you?”

Then I hear in the back of my mind, “But they’re criminals. Many have done terrible things. So why not, they deserve it?” Then, I hear, “Yes, they do. But so do I!” I say that because I hear Jesus’ words from Matthew 5.21-22 (CEV)

“You know that our ancestors were told, “Do not murder” and “A murderer must be brought to trial.” But I promise you that if you are angry with someone, you will have to stand trial. If you call someone a fool, you will be taken to court. And if you say that someone is worthless, you will be in danger of the fires of hell.”

I hear Jesus condemning ‘anger’ as much as ‘murder’, because it is the ‘anger’ that has corrupted the heart. It is the anger that is the sickness, the murder is just the symptom. Now, I’ve never committed murder, but I have been angry. I have heard of things done and I’ve wanted vengeance; I’ve wanted to make someone hurt for what they have done. So that makes me guilty too. I am just as sick as a murderer, I’m just better at hiding it! Indeed, when I think of a criminal in prison, all I can honestly say is, “There but for he grace of God go I”.

I am no better inside me than anyone inside prison, so I should have compassion for those people locked away. This is not soft, this is the heart of the Christian faith. This is certainly not playing down the crimes committed, or the need for society to take action. I know I need to have compassion because I know that I am no better. I also need to have

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compassion because I know that Jesus loves and died for those people in prison, just as much as he died for me. Paul makes this absolutely clear in Romans 5.8 (CEV), "But God showed how much he loved us by having Christ die for us, even though we were sinful." God loved me long before I became a Christian!

Not to have compassion is in effect to say that those people are worthless. Jesus, is just as clear about the huge crime that would be, "And if you say that someone is worthless, you will be in danger of the fires of hell."
(Matthew 5.21 CEV)

So Jesus seems to come out as being weak on crime; a wishy-washy liberal. But I don't think so. He is basically saying that, ruled by our corrupted human passions, we are stupid: I'm stupid, you're stupid, we're all stupid. Jesus is saying that when we are ruled by hate, and malice and fear we make decisions that harm us and all around us. That makes us stupid. We're so stupid that we hate, even though we know that hatred leads naturally to more hatred. We're so stupid that we want vengeance from the courts, knowing without a doubt, that vengeance can only lead to hate, in us and in the person punished.

I am not saying that the police, courts, sentences, consequences and even prisons are not needed. Far from it. I do not believe that this would be Jesus' view either. Jesus' teaching is hard hitting about the devastating consequences of human evil. I do believe that the Spirit is leading me to realise that any steps that are taken must be ruled by compassion. Compassion for the victims and the potential victims, so that they have the best protection possible from harm. Compassion also for the criminal, so that all possible is done to heal the harm done, and lead them away from future crime. For us poor fallen human beings, crime seems inevitable but in our response I hear Jesus saying loud and clear, "Never give in to hate or vengeance". It is so obvious that hate and vengeance just corrupt us even more. Jesus' teaching makes it clear that tackling crime with hate and vengeance is as stupid as tackling a fire with petrol.

Jesus knows what I am like; what we are all like. He knows that love and compassion aren't weak. Jesus knows that without his love, me, my society, and all society is doomed to a cycle of fear, crime, punishment, hate and

more crime. We pay the huge cost too, on average over £33,000 per prisoner per year. Not to mention the police and court costs.

Jesus knows how we human beings work. Jesus knows because he is one with the Creator; he has our instruction manual.

I come to Jesus and I find that I'm far from perfect, but that I am loved, loved, and loved some more by a God who really should have given me and my race up as a bad job long ago. If God can love me that much, then how can I aspire to anything less. If God can love all people that much, what right have I to condemn.

Vision Day: Reflections and Hopes

My Hopes: Firstly, thank you to all of you who got involved in your vision day. You might have filled in a question sheet, joined the week of prayer, prayed at home; you may have participated in the worship and discussion on 29th January – Whatever you did, thank you.

On the day itself my hope was that we might all have deeper understanding of God and loving our neighbour. Any deepening of understanding, for individuals or the group is a success. This love of neighbour would be seen, and had already been seen in local and global responses — the clothing collections for Syria had been a remarkable demonstration of this global response.

On the day I admitted that I had been provoked into doing more here by getting angry, hopefully a good anger. I got angry at the urban bias to national church work on mission and evangelism. If we work on percentages of the population, our rural churches are far more successful than the big city churches. They get less than 1% of the population turning up; for special events in some of our villages we can get close to 90% of the village! Just think if they managed that in London! It is time for us to celebrate the extraordinary things our local churches are achieving - but also to be inspired by this and continue to seek God's leading and his blessing.

Hopes and Fears: As we began I asked people to share their hopes and fears for the day. One person hoped that we might retain an open mind, listen better, and balance speaking and listening to each other. This day of reflection made her wonder the question that is asked of Church Schools. What is our distinctiveness? What is it that we're doing better than anybody else? A question I keep coming back to as a governor.

Further hopes were for honesty and patience with each other because we would achieve nothing without real honesty. With these qualities, the Spirit may move; whatever decisions were reached, they would not be worked out entirely overnight.

End of the Day: At the end of the day I was excited. I had seen people from every church had been enthusiastically talking about loving God and neighbour more (discipleship and mission). The feedback from those who

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had taken part was just as positive. People had really enjoyed the day; it had exceeded expectations.

One person still felt new to the benefice, but amidst the occasional disagreements on her table enjoyed that sense of being part of a large family; not always agreeing, but getting on, nonetheless. She felt that the disagreement reflected being real with each other.

One person was encouraged by the discussions, but wanted to see ongoing momentum, in himself as well as the church, and others talked about the plans already made for continuing prayer and action in their parish.

The Vision Continues: God's Vision for Us: We have just begun to work out God's vision for us. The Benefice Meeting has met and we are keen to work more closely together to help all of the parishes to realise God's vision for them. As a Ministry Team, your ministers have worked through the ideas and 'visions' from the Vision Day and the Benefice Meeting. We've added a few more ideas and we'll be working hard to support you lead and support you all. Some PCCs have had chance to be involved too, and all will soon. Your PCC members will be keeping all of you up-to-date, and please keep feeding your ideas back to them.

A Few Examples: Our Lent Course will be Bible based but it also uses the film "The King's Speech" to help us find our voice as individual Christians and as a Church. It looks good fun too.

We are exploring ways of improving our Benefice Services and how we can move closer together as a benefice. There are prayer events. There are plans for making our churches more visible in our villages. For example, by using our village halls and pubs more, and having some events outdoors. As a start two of our Lent Groups will be meeting in their local pub.

I can see God's Spirit moving here in this benefice, and all that we have done is take more seriously one short, well known passage from the Bible,

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Matthew 22.36-40:

“Teacher, what is the most important commandment in the Law?”

Jesus answered: Love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, and mind. This is the first and most important commandment. The second most important commandment is like this one. And it is, “Love others as much as you love yourself.” All the Law of Moses and the Books of the Prophets are based on these two commandments.

That's why we have a Lent Appeal. The generosity of Jesus Christ inspires our own. This year it's to raise funds to provide a car for Hospice Ethiopia to reach those in need of palliative care. We want to help enable care and equipment to reach those who cannot travel to the hospice. Do give generously. And remember Christ's endless generosity to us.

Hospice Ethiopia is the only palliative care unit in Ethiopia. Your gift will provide a car enabling them to reach those who can't travel.

Your Gift

Through the appeal, your money will go towards providing the Hospice with an off-road rental car for two years. Roads are often rough and of poor quality, and public transport is busy and unreliable. We want to help enable care and equipment to reach those who cannot travel to the hospice.

Cars are expensive and difficult to maintain given the availability of parts. By renting the vehicle all maintenance costs are included; well advised given the quality of the roads. In addition, the nurses are frequently carrying medicines to their patients, in particular opiate pain killers, which would make them vulnerable on public transport.

palliative care unit in Ethiopia.**

With just one specially trained doctor and three nurses, they provide free community based palliative care to terminally ill people within three districts of the capital city, an estimated population of 900,000.

There is only one qualified doctor working in palliative care in Ethiopia.

In 2017, the Bishop's Lent Appeal is focused on raising money to provide a car for Hospice Ethiopia so they can reach those in need of palliative care.


